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
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From the President—-Rich Fleischer

A Letter from Kurtis Wolford

It was a very hot summer. It was one for the record books, the 2nd hottest in Sacramento EVER! At our weather station here at the course we registered 28 days in a row off 100-degree days, 9 of those days were above 106 degrees. Comparatively we have registered 45 days of 100 degrees or higher. Our seasonal average is 23 days. When you have those type of temperatures coupled with humidity it's a superintendent's nightmare. It's a lot of sleepless nights and a lot of spraying fungicide. Even with the best fungicide program, Cool season turf that we have cannot live for very long in that environment. On the flipside the Bermuda was thriving.

The relentless heat combined with our made in 1964 irrigation piping and design, showed its limitations. The old piping is paper thin and breaks a lot. We try and keep up the best we can with breaks. Not just because of the golf course playability but also because of the cost of water. Carmichael Water District water rates are not cheap. Water cost is the golf courses single biggest line-item expense. We have to watch how much water we apply. Even on the park side. We have the computer control system programed so our projected gallons pumped every night is within 1-1.5% of actual water pumped at the pumps. That is really good for an old system. Our irrigation system is not a system that is designed for golf courses. It is a system designed for a park. The block system that has 1 valve that has up to 10 heads on it is not a golf design. We do not have control over each head on the valve. We only have control over the total block. Each head gets the same amount of water. Typical golf irrigation systems have individual control over each sprinkler head. For Ancil to get better in the summer we need a new irrigation system. Irrigation systems usually only last 30 years before they need to be replaced.


We just finished aerating the greens. We went back to basics on our seasonal maintenance. We started using the VERTIDRAIN again this year. We have what is called pushup greens that have no drainage in them. In the summer that is a major problem. The more water that gets held up in the rootzone turns into a wet spongy mess with the potential for bad fungi. Especially one called Pythium. Rich Sizelove, the former super of the county, use to use the vertidrain religiously when he was here to get the greens to drain. We reimplemented the practice this year of solid tining 1/2 in holes down 6+ inches. We followed that with a conventional core aerification with 7/16 in tines on very tight spacing.

Only aerating 1X year for the last 20 years has caught up with us. Each year a golf green produces organic material in the thatch and root zone. That organic matter clogs up drainage and creates a spongy green. To correctly manage the rate a green reproduces Organic matter, you need to remove a certain percentage of

organic matter each year. AREATING 1X per year does not come close to removing the percentage of organic matter created for the year. Each year we are losing ground and clogging up our greens. Our past practices have caught up with us. Going forward we will be using different techniques to incorporate sand into the green and remove organic matter. The theme of the newsletter is drainage. We will be getting back to standard Best Management Practices going forward so we can provide better greens year-round.

We have lots of things going coming up, with overseeding rough areas and sanding and mulching these areas to improve soil conditions. We have some yearly tree maintenance coming in October to tackle some trouble areas that do not get much sunlight. Lots of good things coming down the road.

The Putting Green

The putting green is one of the five defined areas of the course. It is an area specifically prepared for putting, which means you have some special permissions here, including the ability to mark, lift and clean your ball any time. To mark and lift your ball, you must use a ball-marker, which is an artificial object like a coin or tee. You are also permitted to repair most damage (other than natural wear) on the putting green, including spike marks, and remove sand and loose soil – even when your ball is off the putting green.


Once you have marked, lifted, and replaced your ball on the putting green, your ball owns that spot. So if it moves for any reason, you will replace it without penalty. If you have not marked, lifted, and replaced your ball, whether you replace it or play it from its new location depends on the cause of the movement. If you or anyone else accidentally causes your ball to move, replace it. If wind or another natural force causes it to move, play it from its new location. There is no penalty in either case.

On the putting green, the flagstick indicates where the hole is located. You are allowed to putt with the flagstick in the hole, and there is no penalty if your ball strikes the flagstick. If the flagstick is attended or removed while you make your stroke, it can be moved out of the way while your ball is in motion. If you decide to leave the flagstick in the hole, it must be left in position from the time you make your stroke until your ball comes to rest.

Here are some FAQs:

- **Q.** May I putt with the flagstick in?
- A. Yes, there is no penalty for leaving the flagstick in. You may do this from anywhere on the golf course including when your ball is on the putting green (see Rule 13.2a).
- **Q.** I accidentally caused my ball to move on the putting green do I replace it?
- A. Yes. There is no penalty for accidentally causing your ball to move on the putting green but you must replace it on its original spot before making your next stroke (see Rule 13.1d(1)).
- **Q.** The wind moved my ball on the putting green do I replace it?
- A. If you haven't touched your ball yet (by marking and lifting it or accidentally causing it to move), then you must play from where the ball came to rest. If you have marked, lifted and replaced your ball, or you replaced it because you or someone else caused it to move, and then it later moves for any reason including by wind, you must replace your ball on its original spot before making your next stroke (see Rule 13.1d (2)).
- **Q.** I accidentally moved my ball-marker on the putting green what do I do?
- A. There is no penalty for accidentally causing your ball-marker to move. If this happens, you must either replace the ball-maker or replace your ball on its original spot before making your next stroke (see Rule 13.1d(1)).
- **Q.** When is my ball considered holed?
- A. When your ball is at rest in the hole after a stroke and the entire ball is below the surface of the putting green (see Definition of Holed). For the special case of a ball resting against the flagstick in the hole, see Rule 13.2c.
- **Q.** The hole is damaged may I fix it?
- A. Yes. You may repair damage to the hole, but not natural wear of the hole (see Rule 13.1c(2)).
- **Q.** What kind of damage am I allowed to repair on the putting green?
- **A.** You may repair any damage caused by a person, animal or other outside influence including things such as shoe damage, damage from a player's golf club, a hole left by an embedded object, ball-marks or a turf plug from an old hole (see Rule 13.1c(2)).

- **Q.** May I remove sand and/or loose soil on the putting green?
- A. Yes. Sand and loose soil may be removed on the putting green (see Rule 13.1c(1)). But, if you remove sand or loose soil anywhere else on the course, you may not improve the conditions affecting your next stroke (this means to improve your lie, area of intended stance, area of intended swing or line of play) when doing so.
- **Q.** May I kneel or lie on the green to read a putt?
- A. Although not recommended, yes. If the putting green is damaged because of this, the damage may be repaired (see Rule 13.1c(2)).
- **Q.** My ball stopped and is overhanging the hole how long may I wait for it to fall into the hole?
- A. You are allowed a reasonable amount of time to get to the hole plus an additional ten seconds once there to see if it will fall in (see Rule 13.3).
- **Q.** What am I allowed to use to mark the spot of my ball?
- A. The spot of your ball must be marked with a ball-marker or with your club. A ball-marker is an artificial object such as a tee, coin, or other object made to be a ball-marker, or another small piece of equipment (see Definition of Ball-Marker and Mark).
- **Q.** Is there such a thing as an illegal hole location?
- **A.** No, hole locations are determined by the Committee.

With all of this talk about the greens, I thought that this would be a good bit of information for all. I think that this would mainly apply to teeing off on hole #5 and landing on hole #2.

Rule 13.1.f

f. Relief Must Be Taken from Wrong Green

(1) <u>Meaning of Interference by Wrong Green</u>. Interference under this Rule exists when: Any part of the player's ball touches a *wrong green* or lies on or in anything (such as a *loose impediment* or an *obstruction*) and is inside the edge of a *wrong green*, or

A wrong green physically interferes with the player's area of intended stance or area of intended swing.

(2) <u>Relief Must Be Taken</u>. When there is interference by a *wrong green*, a player must not play the ball as it lies.

Instead, the player must take free relief by *dropping* the original ball or another ball in this *relief area* (see Rule 14.3):

Reference Point: The *nearest point of complete relief* in the same *area of the course* where the original ball came to rest.

<u>Size of Relief Area Measured from Reference Point</u>: One *club-length*, **but** with these limits: Limits on Location of Relief Area:

Must be in the same *area* of the course as the reference point, Must not be nearer the *hole* than the reference point, and There must be complete relief from all interference by the *wrong green*.



- When there is interference by a wrong green, free relief must be taken and the player must take complete relief.
- · The diagram assumes a right-hand player.
- Ball A lies on the wrong green, and the nearest point of complete relief for Ball A is at P1, which must be in the same area of the course where the original ball came to rest (in this case, the general area).
- The relief area is one club-length from the reference point, is not nearer to the hole than the
 reference point and must be in the same area of the course as the reference point, P1.

I can see this happening after someone tees off on hole #5. Maybe it already has happened. Either way, a sign should be posted for this amazing feat!



Match Team Captain's Interviews

In case anyone did not know, the Ancil Hoffman Golf Club has three Match Play teams. One team plays on Thursdays, one team plays on Saturdays, and there is a Scratch team. This year both Thursday and Saturday teams made it into the playoffs. This edition's interview is with the captain and co-captain of each of the Thursday and Saturday teams.

Let's start with the Saturday Captains (Captain Mike Dadey & Co-Captain Matt Gilchrist):

Moose: What does the Team Match Play (TMP) consist of?

Mike: The NCGA Team Match competition is a regional team-based golf event. It involves regular clubs competing in groups of three or four teams, with each team fielding 12 players per match. Matches are conducted both home and away, and players are matched by their index to compete in both individual and team formats simultaneously. Points are awarded for wins and ties. At the end of the regular season, the group winners move on to a playoff bracket where 32 teams face off in a head-to-head competition until a champion is determined.

Moose: How has this year's team been performing?

Matt: We're currently in the Quarterfinals, playing against Wilcox Oaks on 9/21.

Moose: How long have you been a Captain/Co-Captain, and on the team?

Matt: I've served as Captain/Co-Captain for approximately 16 - 18 years, working with Khalil Cox, Chuck Ashen, Rich Fleischer and Mike Dadey.

Mike: Captain this year, Co-Captain last year. Been on the team since 2018.

Moose: How many players are on the team? How many of them play in a match?

Matt: The team roster is not limited by the NCGA, but only 12 may perform in each match.

Moose: How do you decide who will play in the next match?

Matt: A lot of strategy goes into how we've determined who plays from match to match. A few of the factors may involve index comparison vs. opponent, partner compatibility, "hot hand", home vs. away preferences, the away course layout, tailgate participation, etc.

Moose: How can someone join the team? What kind of commitment is needed?

Matt: Every year we seek to add additional players, often provided by referral or recommendation from an existing team member.

Mike: We also look at the match play for the club. See who is doing well and done well, as match play is a whole different mindset.

Moose: Of the previous teams that you have been a part of, what is the farthest that team made it in the playoffs?

Matt: We made the finals in 2018 at Poppy Hills but lost to Oakhurst in the Weekend Finals.

Moose: Do you have any fond memories or great stories from playing in TMP?

Matt: Two memories come to mind, 2nd round match vs. Turlock CC approximately 15 years ago, match was tied 18 - 18, we go to sudden death playoff and Will Alexander dunks a bunker shot for a birdie to extend the match to a second playoff hole and completely silences a crowd that had gathered around the 18th green. Next memory was a quarterfinal match vs. Fountaingrove CC in 2018 where we won 16 of 18 points on the road and advanced to semi-finals vs. Pajaro Dunes (which has its own stories, but I wasn't part of the away team that match, but Casper and Whiskey River may have been born that trip!).

Mike: I agree with Fountaingrove. From the only bar open the morning being the Santa Rosa airport and the Fountaingrove clubhouse being burned in the fire, along with many houses, the win there was big. The Fountaingrove members were some of the most welcoming we have played as an away team, even in total defeat.

I was also part of the away team to Pajaro Dunes. Casper and Chowder were born from maybe some excess alcohol and someone's overriding desire for clam chowder.

Thank you, Mike and Matt, for participating in this interview process!

Next, we will talk with the Thursday Captains (Captain Tom Lopez & Co-Captain Chuck Calkin):

Moose: What does the Team Match Play (TMP) consist of?

Tom: TMP consists of this year over 30 leagues across California from Fresno to Oregon border. You play the regular season from 1st of May to end of July. Playoffs start in August and can continue to mid-October if you keep on winning. Each league has 3-4 teams. This year, our league consisted of Haggin Oaks, Timber Creek, Wildhawk and Ancil. You play each team twice, home and away. You play a 12-man team, 6 groups playing, 2 in each group playing individual match and a team match. A possible 6 points for each group. You add up scores of each group to determine winner of the match. The winner of your league automatically advances to playoffs! There are also wildcard teams that make playoffs. Wildcard teams determined by total points scored over the course of the season.

Chuck: Each won game is worth 2 points and ties are worth 1 point. Tom and my philosophy this year is to make sure the players understand that even if you are losing your match, you can still help the team match. Every point matters. In the playoffs this philosophy has helped as we have had no teams get shutout and several of our teams have shut out their opponents.

Moose: How has this year's team been performing?

Tom: This year we won our league 4-2. We won the tiebreaker with Wildhawk, beating them by more points than they beat us. We needed a clutch win on the road at Timber Creek to do so.

Little story, nothing better than walking into opponents crowded bar celebrating a close fought victory. I played in the last group. I walked into the bar and all of our players were looking at me saying we needed 4 points. We had secured those 4 points! All of us went nuts knowing that we were moving on to the playoffs!

Moose: How long have you been a Captain/Co-Captain, and on the team?

Tom: I have been the captain for Ancil's Thursday match play team for 3 years. Before that, I was co-captain with Pat Harrold. I have been playing on Ancil's team for at least the last 13 years. For most of the years, Rick Wiley was the captain, and the first few years Brett Dodge was the captain.

Chuck: I started helping out Tom last year mostly in recruiting and stepped up to the assistant role this year.

Moose: How many players are on the team?

Tom: There are 32 players on the team.

Chuck: During the fall and early winter Tom and I identify players we want to play on the team and approach them to gauge their interest.

Moose: How do you decide who will play in the next match?

Tom: I first send out an email to all 32 on the roster. I then ask for availability. We chose 12 guys for each match that we think will give us the best chance of winning. The beginning of the league, we try to get as many players as possible in the lineup. Of course, the more you win the more you play, lol!

Chuck: This is the hardest part of being a captain. We are limited by handicaps who can play in what position. So, our lowest 2 handicappers for that week will be the 1st match and so on. When players commit to playing and then have a conflict it upsets who plays in what group. Our group has responded very well when we have asked them to step up.

Moose: How can someone join the team? What kind of commitment is needed?

Tom: To join reach out to me or Chuck. I am trying to figure out what kind of commitment is needed. The larger roster is needed since summer has a ton of vacations, etc. We will be trying to find a middle ground with a commitment.

Chuck: Anyone can play on the team but is mostly for competitive golfers with a handicap below 18. Most players play at least 1 match during the season of 6 total matches. Unfortunately, due to scheduling conflicts we had several of our team not able to play at all. Only players that play at least 1 match are eligible for the playoffs. This year 25 different players played at least 1 match, giving us a very deep team going into the playoffs. The playoffs are grueling as it takes about 10 weeks additionally added to an already long season. We started in May and will go until October if we continue to win.

Moose: Of the previous teams that you have been a part of, what is the farthest that team made it in the playoffs?

Tom: 10 years ago, I was a part of the team that reached the final 8.

Chuck: For the last 2 years. We missed the playoffs by 2 points each year.

Moose: Do you have any fond memories or great stories from playing in TMP?

Tom: Here's a story. I was on the first tee, 10 years ago, in our match to move to the final four, when I suffered a stroke. It's called a TIA (Transient Ischemic Attack). I played my round, not knowing I had a stroke. I was playing with a current player, Mike Dobrin and I couldn't tell you the results. I ended up spending the night and most of the next day at Kaiser hospital in Modesto.

Chuck: Best memory for me this year was being down to Wildhawk at home. We had lost to them on the road 20-16 and we needed to beat them by 21-15 at home. After 3 matches we were down 14-4. I was waiting at the pro shop waiting for the other 3 matches to be completed. Joe Fleming came off 18. They had won their match 6-0. He had a big smile on his face. Then our 5th match came in 6-0. Now we needed our 6th match to win at least 3. They won 5-1. What a comeback. We ended up winning the tiebreaker in a very close conference. Overall, we finished 1st and Wildhawk finished 2nd but I felt like that was the turning point in our season. We ended up winning every match after that.

Moose: What is up next for your team?

Tom: After this year's success, we are developing some core players. We are going to try to work with Doug Olson on his match play tournament to recruit more players. Different ideas, match play tourneys, developing more team camaraderie, etc.


Chuck: We have won our 1st two playoff matches against a tough Northridge team and crushed Granite Bay. Next up is Wilcox Oaks outside Red Bluff. 6 of our players will travel there and 6 will play at home. We are 2 wins away from playing in the Poppy Hills Final!

If there are two or more teams tied after hole 18 is completed, then there is a chip off to determine the overall winner.






