# Email Suppression Issue

The Ancil Hoffman Golf Club depends on Technology to improve our efficiency and Member experience. We use Golf genius as our Email Service and the email would appear as [noreply@golfgenius.com](mailto:noreply@golfgenius.com). We have noticed that many of the emails we're sending to Members are getting "Suppressed" meaning they are not being delivered.

This appears to happen because the Internet Service Provider (ISP) is blocking the email because it looks like SPAM. The best way to correct this issue is to locate the "noreply@golfgenius.com" email in your Inbox Folder or in Junk Folder. Right click on the email and scroll down to "Block" and select (left-click). If you are given a choice, select "Never Block Sender" as depicted in the Diagram below. After right clicking, there may also be an option that says, "Not Spam". Left click on that. Either way, future emails from GG should appear in your inbox.

# From the Treasurer—Bob Hutchison

## 2025 Budget Report

As the Treasurer for a third year, I am pleased to report that our membership trends for the first quarter of 2024 are consistent with last year's and we're projecting an end-of-year membership total of around 620 members. Ancil Hoffman Golf Club continues to offer great value with low fees and numerous tournaments. Please encourage friends, family, and colleagues to join our club!

As always, this year's budget focuses on the allocation of membership dues and spending them, judiciously. Most expenses remain unchanged, except for increased fees set by the NCGA. One key change is separating Midweek (Thursday) and Humpday (Wednesday) tournaments in the budget, as they are independent events. Additionally, we've increased payouts for these weekday tournaments to boost their profile and participation.

Another change is with the Putting Contest, Skills Competition, and Horse Race are now categorized as Special Events, rather than their previous classifications. These FUN events aim to enhance the club's visibility and increase participation.

The budget for this year includes additional funds for a "Tee prize" from the President to the members. This year's Tee prize is particularly special and features our newly created logo.

## From Course Affairs—Brett Dodge

Hi All,

Sacramento County and the Parks and Rec Department are going to start a long overdue project that will affect our golf. Beginning in March or early April, the road into Ancil as well as the parking lots will be repaved! You may have noticed the trees in the main parking lot were taken down. This was done in preparation of the repaving (new trees will be planted that are more suitable for these areas).

Since the paving process is fluid, be aware that there may be tournament days (or regular golf days for you regulars) when there is some congestion entering the park. Since the road will not be closed, longer entrance times are unavoidable and you should plan ahead. Most likely it will be completed one day when you arrive to play--with no inconvenience, but since we don't know when the contractor's exact start/end times are, it's best to be prepared. I'd recommend checking the top of the website for updates as we'll keep you updated on their progress and any potential hindrance to your travel.

That's it, keep it in the short grass!

# A Letter from Kurtis Wolford

From the Course Spring 2025

Spring is here rather quickly and for the golf maintenance side of the course that means its go time.... The golf season is here. It's been a very cold and wet winter. It seemed that it was either very cold or it was rainy. I can't remember a winter that was that cold. Frost delays were getting old.

Through the fall and winter, we made several improvements around the course. Some golfers will never really see or is not that exciting. On the maintenance side are big improvements. Irrigation improvements. The biggest gains we made this winter are on irrigation. We are trying to maximize the hydraulic efficiency of this 60-year-old park irrigation system. Some stations run multiple valves that run up to 15 heads. When you have that many heads turned on in one location the pressure is let's just say it is inadequate. We have separated many of those multi valve stations areas to maximize pressure. As an added benefit doing this also greatly reduces water hammer. This reduces how many broken pipes we have. Any irrigation improvement that we can make to maximize how efficiently we can move water is very important for us. This also applies to the irrigation in the park and game fields. Since all of the park and golf share the same pumps and control system, I have to program it to maximize efficiencies irrigating a lot of acreage.

On the agronomic side let's chat about a few things. The 1st being greens. Our old greens need help. They need drainage. Golf greens produce a certain percentage of organic matter each year. It is called thatch. It's a byproduct of how turf grows. As thatch degrades if it accumulates as organic matter in greens. In a sand-based soil that is designed to drain, organic matter will limit how the soil drains. When we verticut, aerify, sand topdress these agronomic processes are meant to help manage organic matter. The problem is that we are behind on managing organic matter. Year after year of only aerifying greens 1x per year for numerous years has put us in a position where the percentage of organic matter in the greens has clogged up the soil. To make the math easy each year the greens produce around 10% organic matter. A standard aerification removes 4%. Verticutting removes 1% through the season. Top-dressing 1%. So you can see if we do not aerify 2x we are not removing enough organic matter to maximize drainage. Any time we can poke holes in the greens or inject sand into greens like what we did this week it's a win. We must get cleaner sand into the greens to maximize drainage. If we don't do this the greens will hold too much water and stay too wet in the hot summer. That's bad news for turf grass roots. They are very susceptible to fungus and other diseases. Golf Greens need well drained soil. Golf Greens are not easy to manage, especially if organic matter is not managed. Most courses opt to skip these processes due to the revenue implications aerification has on the tee sheet. It's a business decision. That decision management has decided and weigh the long range implications.

Some of the other things we are doing around the course are tree trimming. This is too important for Ancil. We have come a long way in managing the tree canopy. It's getting better through these storms we have had far fewer tree failures because they are being maintained. The removal of structurally dangerous trees is very important. As trees were planted on the course over the years many were planted in the wrong areas. Examples of this are numerous around the course. Trees planted right next to the infrastructure ( water mainlines, Cart paths), Trees planted too close to each other, (overcrowding). It's our job to sometimes take corrective actions and make necessary tree removals where they should have never been planted to fix these problems.

We are excited to see how our winter projects will help improve summer conditions this year. We are really hoping for a mild summer..... not a repeat of last year's summer.

Moose: After high school, what did you do?

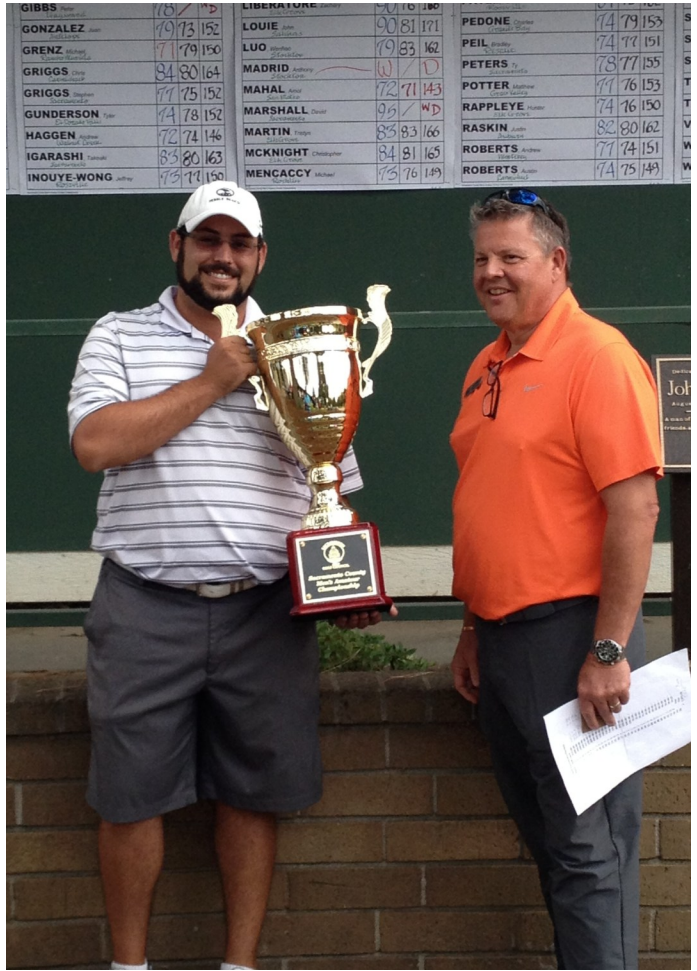
Zach: I had a great summer before starting college.

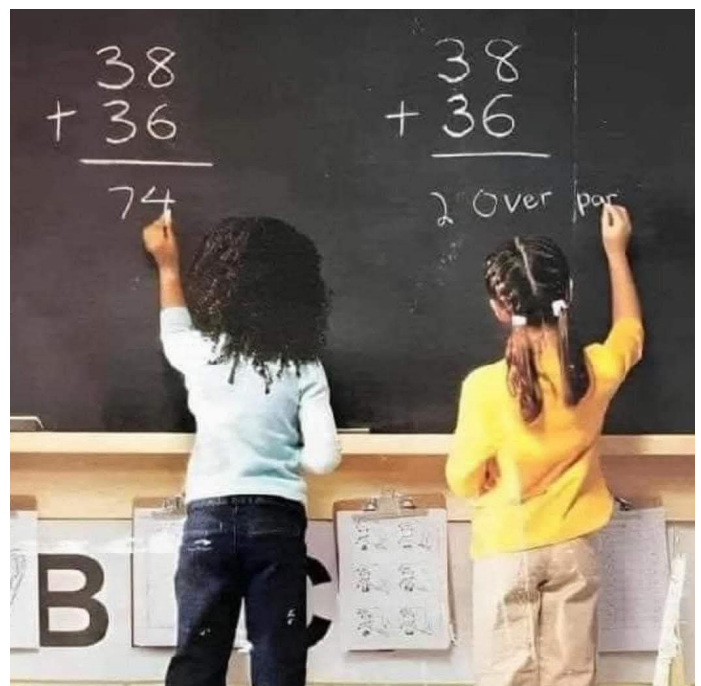

# The Iconic Story of Augusta National

Augusta National Golf Club is a monument to golf's timeless allure and rich tradition, strategically nestled in the rolling hills of Augusta, Georgia. Every April, the world-renowned club hosts The Masters Tournament, establishing its spot at the pinnacle of professional golf and serving as a beacon of history, beauty, and exclusivity. ## **Founding Visionaries**

Golf legend Bobby Jones is the backbone of Augusta National. He birthed the revolutionary concept in the early 1930s, shortly after retiring from competitive golf, having completed the Grand Slam in 1930. The tournament took a different path from other events of the day, introducing unique traditions that later became the hallmarks of The Masters. Roberts' astuteness birthed a pristine presentation, from the iconic green jackets awarded to champions starting in 1949 to the immaculate course condition.

As expected, The Masters swiftly gained recognition and prestige, attracting the world's best golf talent. The tournament is home to many of golf's greatest moments, from Gene Sarazen's famous Shot Heard 'Round the World in 1935 to Tiger Woods' record-breaking victory in 1997.

## **Traditions and Legacy**

Augusta National is a haven for rich tradition, with the dogwoods and blooming azaleas signaling the arrival of spring and serving as the perfect curtain raiser for The Masters. Another famed spot at Augusta is the Amen Corner, named by sportswriter Herbert

# The evolution of Augusta National, as seen through these rare 1950s photos

For golfers, April is a trigger. It conjures visions of pink blooming azaleas, white dogwood blossoms, blue-mirrored water and wild sculptures of slick green grass. April, in other words, is Augusta National. If this is the vision of Augusta National we share now, it's important to note it wasn't always quite this way. The course, since it was created, has been in a state of perpetual flux.

When we have the chance to look at photos of the original holes Alister Mackenzie built in the early 1930s, it's easy to be shocked at [how different it was from the current Augusta National](#). More subtle but no less important are the alterations it made since the 1950s, when the course, and the Masters Tournament, became closer to what we now know them to be.

In the 1930s, a turf researcher named O.J. Noer began traveling widely, taking photographs primarily of experimental grass plots and fertilizer application reactions, but also of golf courses. The following slides of Augusta National were taken by Noer during Masters Week, 1955.

The placement and orientation of the course's fairway bunkers, as a reaction to improvements in technology and to where the players were driving the ball, mark some of the most notable changes through the years (in preparation for the 2019 Masters, for instance, the bunkers on the inside corner of the fifth hole were deepened and pushed farther down the fairway).



The fairway bunker on the par-5 second hole, as seen above, was originally placed in the center of the fairway to force decisions off the tee. Over the years it has gradually shifted to the right, and now is more of an aiming point for today's players, a target to work the ball off of.



The second-most notable difference, and no less critical, is how drastically the bunker profiles have changed. The course's brilliant white flashed sand faces didn't exist in 1955. What we have come to identify as a bunker style intrinsic to the Augusta National character came about gradually, originating from flatter floors and thick sod toplines.



The current seventh hole, which today features some of the most obvious and extravagant bunkering on the course, was far less emphatic in Sam Snead's day (this green was created by Perry Maxwell in the late 1930s—the original seventh as envisioned by Mackenzie had no bunkers).



The par-5 eighth hole has undergone significant alterations. Much like the second hole, it too presented its fairway bunker as a central hazard, forcing players to choose a side. Two years after the following photo was taken, the club enlarged the bunker but moved it to the right edge of the fairway, making it a much simpler driving hole, thereby creating more opportunities for players to reach the green in two.



The green at the eighth appears similar in the following photo as it does now. But in 1956, at the direction of Clifford Roberts, the distinctive mounds were removed to increase spectator sightlines. What was left behind was a low, flat and awkwardly exposed putting surface out of character with the course's complex green formations.

Though Bobby Jones disliked it, the hole remained in this state until the mid-1970s when Byron Nelson (along with consulting architect Joe Finger) was asked to help recreate the surrounding mounds from memory. The club presumably did not have access to this slide.



Over the years Augusta National has continued to add length by shifting and building new tees. Perhaps the most significant odyssey has been the tee complex at the par-4 11th. They were initially located above and behind the 10th green, then were moved above and to the green's right. That created a rather sharp dogleg, and tournament players either hit irons off the tee or, occasionally, hit big slices that could travel down close to the green.

In 1950 the club shifted the tournament tee into the woods well to the left of and below the tenth green, straightening and lengthening the hole considerably, with room to extend almost indefinitely. This 1955 photo, however, appears as if it was taken from the old tee above and to the right of the tenth, indicating the degree of the left-to-right dogleg.





The green setting at the famous par-5 13th has been altered over the years as well. The bunkers to the rear of the green were remodeled prior to the 1955 Masters. In the early 1980s Jack Nicklaus would tinker more, adding a chipping swale between the bunkers and the putting surface.



The final essential amendment the club has made to the course is the addition of trees in select areas. The most notable have been several rows of pines to the right of the 11th, pines pinching the landing zone on the 17th, and a cluster of pines impinging into the driving area on the left side of the par-5 15th. Previously players could gun for the green over the fronting pond from almost any position in the wide fairway. Now, the trees block a clear shot from drives pulled slightly left.



Similarly, on the par-4 17th, once drives got past the now deceased Eisenhower Tree, the fairway was wide open, and players could use the width to select the best angle to approach the green depending on the hole location and conditions.



Trees always surrounded the tee at the 18th, but as the tee has migrated back further, creating a chute-like tee shot, they've increasingly come into play and accentuated the need to shape the drive left-to-right.



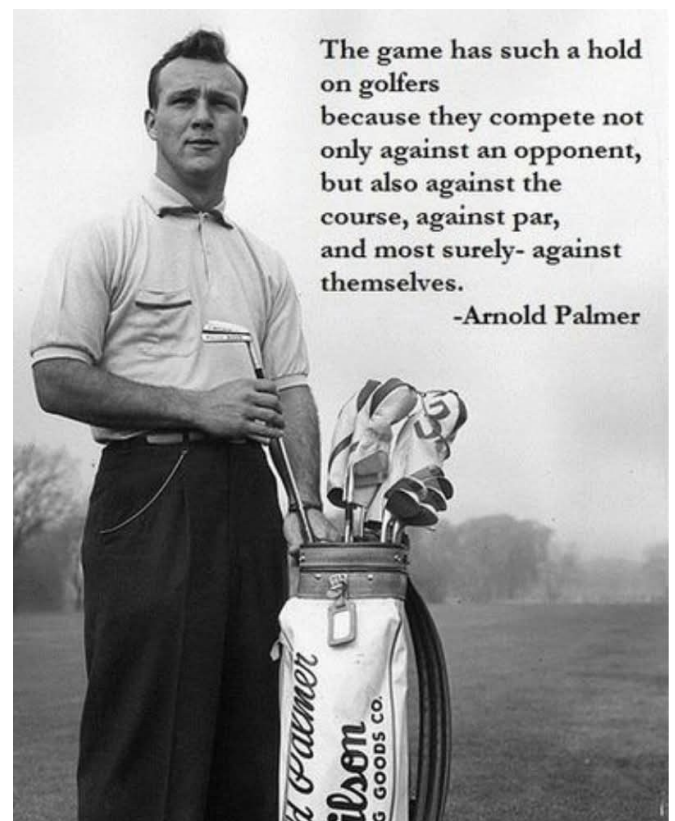


All golf courses morph and change throughout their lifetimes, but Augusta National has always been unique in its drive to match its conditioning and architecture to the changing demands of the Masters Tournament. Someday in the future we'll look on today's Augusta National and marvel at how differently it played and appeared.
